



TRIAL STEEL ROADWAY. Being Watched with Interest by Road Builders.

An experimental steel highway ecently been laid in Murray street, between Broadway and Church s New York. The Automobile club of America has been instrumental in securing this trial, and President Charles M. Schwab, of the United States Steel corporation, furnished the steel at his own expense. Gen. Roy Stone, formerly head of the bureau of goad inquiry, department of agriculture, has charge of the experiment.

At present there is only a single roadway up the center of the street, on which loaded teams coming from the North river piers are given the right of way. A trial will also e made on some dirt road, for the advantages of the steel rail are considered to be as great for a country road as for city streets.

A thorough series of traction tests are to be carried on in connection with the roadway in Murray street, and the other places where the rails are laid. A dynamometer will be used and the tractive force necessary to draw a truck over the granite paving will be compared with that necessary to draw. it along the steel roadway. In addition to this test, records have been made showing the amount and weight of traffic on the street previous to the improvement, and further observations will be taken from time to time to see whether there is any increase in the traffic passing up this street.

bureau of road inquiry, but lack of means to procure the desired shape of rail has hampered the bureau in its investigations. One of these rails was with an eight-inch trackway on a gravel foundation, the weight of steel being about 100 tons per mile of single track road, furnished at \$35 per ton. The most extended use of steel rails for roadways for which data is available is in Spain on the road between Valencia and Grao, where about two miles of flint stone roudway was replaced by steel rails some ten years ago at a total cost of \$9,500. The surface of the rails was placed somewhat lower than the paved road, at the sides. The cost of maintenance of this road, over which a traffic of 3,200 vehicles passed daily, was at once greatly reduced, and the result was considered satisfactory in other ways. It seems probable that such a roadway as this would be greatly appreciated by market gardeners in the vicinity of large cities .- N. Y. Tribune.

SOME IMMENSE FARMS.

While the United States census re ports 5,000,000 farms averaging 146 acres each in the southwest states and territories, the average size is 500 acres each. Col. C. C. Slaughter, of Dallas, Tex., has 1,250,000 acres of farm and ranch land. In the Panhandle district of Texas the Capitol syndicate, of which Senator C. B. Farwell, of Illinois, is the head, has a ranch of 3,000,000 acres, or more than as large as the state of Connecticut. They raise from 10,000 to 20,000 acres of corn and other forage crops and ship from 18,000 to 20,000 beef steers each year; 250 cowboys and 50 farmhands are employed. In Oklahoma is one ranch of 50,000 acres. They raised this year 8,000 acres of wheat, 5,000 acres of forage, millet and Kaffir corn; 8,000 to 10,-000 cattle are shipped each year. Alranch are \$95,000 a year, the profits the last year were \$150,000. The Forsha farm in central Kansas has 5,000 acres. It Is Strong, Easily Put Together and Can Be Used with Snow or Without.

I have been putting out some lumber, and as there was little snow I have used the sled shown herewith. It is called a snapdragon and is such as is used in the lumber camp. It can be used with or without snow. I took two yellow birch stumps about



six inches through and three feet

six inches through and three feet long for runners. The two bunks were about the same size and two feet eight inches long. The forward bunk is put on with one bolt in each end, so it can have a good chance to work.

For he middle bunk I put two two-inch holes through each runner, then took a small, round birch of the size wanted, heated it hot in a fire and bent it in the shape needed to put over the middle bunk and the two ends down through the runner, then wedged them solid, but so there would be plenty of play. The nose of the runners must be made so they will not catch on every rock or will not catch on every rock or stump. This can be done by putting the forward bunk at the very end of the runner. The chain is put on: the log with a half hitch and drawn through a hole through both bunks; Birch is the best wood, as it wears the smoothest on frozen ground .-Orange Judd Farmer.




Gen. Stone has made a very exhaustive study of steel highways, and has had several patents issued to him in regard to constructive details. These he states are to be entirely free to the city of New York to make use of, should the experiments prove as successful as is hoped. In rolling rails for further experiments it is proposed to make use of a special roll having slight projections on its surface, perhaps an inch square. The last time the rail goes through the rolls this will be put on and will leave corresponding depressions in the finished rail.
