### Cattle Died.

Minot Optic: Tom Taylor\_a well known resident of Willow City, returned yesterday from Calgary and the Alberta country in Manitoba, and reports great loss of live stock in that section resulting from the snow storm there last Monday. He says that thousands of head of cattle and sheep, which were exposed to the ravages of the wind and snow, perished and are lying dead on the prairies. In some instances where people and new settlers were not prepared for such an occurrence, they too, experienced more or less hardship from cold, and many of the new comers, who have the means, Mr. Taylor states, are going back to their former homes. Some of them, however, will locate in North Dakota, if they can secure situable locations. The loss sustained by the storm, is estimated at many thousands of dollars and has greatly influenced detrimentally the immigration into the Northwestern territory.
