

Few of us get the best there is in our That is because we do not out the best there is in us into them. There wisn't much use in expecting great things on the farm unless we are willing to plan, work and study how to get those great things. How shall we go at it to do that? asks E. L. Vincent in Farm and Fireside.

In the first place, the soil must be

in a good state of fertility. This means that we have carefully saved up every particle of barnyard manure we have, and have seconded this effort by a judicious use of commercial fertilizer. It means, too, that we have not previously cropped the land to death Then, we will plow thoroughly, Not one man out of ten in this country he has not the grit and the gymption to do it. Once in a while we meet a farmer who insists that his part of the farm work shall be done thoroughly. He is on the way to success. It was an old Scotchman who said, "Ye dinna ken how to plow in this country; ye on'y scratch the groon." And that is about what most of us farmers do-

we scratch the ground. And again, to get the best there is in our farms we must use the harrow more faithfully. The farmer has no better tool than a good harrow. I say a "good" barrow because hosts of farmers have not such a thing as a first-class harrow on the place. They are working away with the same old V-shaped "drag" their fathers used, or else have picked up at some sale a worn out thing not worth bringing home. No good work can be done with such a tool. Harrows of an upto-date pattern are reasonable in price nowadays, and every farmer ought to


Good, clean seed is a requisite, too. No use to sow seed that will not grow or that is full of weed seed. This may mean the purchase of a fanning mill, to be used in recleaning seed. We may better do this than to seed our farms down with foul weeds.

GOOD SOIL CULTIVATOR.

Homenade Machine, Not Very Handsome in Appearance But of Great Practical Value.

is generally considered rather high by the ordinary farmer or amateur. The work the factory made machines do, however, is about perfect.

This machine, although homemade and not very handsome in appearance, does the work as well as a \$6 or \$8 tool, and costs not more than 40 cents to make. For a wheel, take the fly wheel of an old sewing machine, about one foot in diameter, and put a round bolt tightly through the axle. Then take a piece of plank, (a), 20x10 inches, and cut as shown. boring holes for the axle where marked. After the wheel is set in place, it should turn easily and steadily, if balanced properly. For the handle (c c), cut out and round from a piece of plank two pieces, or use any that may be otherwise obtained. Then get a blacksmith to make three teeth (b) out of a piece of spring steel one inch wide and eight holes are drilled through them for

One tooth should be placed about six inches behind the wheel and directly in the center, the other two being four inch s behind the first and the same distance from the center tooth. When this cultivator is pushed through the rows, it should run with little pressure from the operator, clearing out the weeds and stirring the soil at the same time. Though not very handsome, this homemade arrangement does the work well and if given two coats of brown or green paint, will be improved in appearance. Edgar Mackinley, in Farm and Home.


