MAY BE DOLLAR WHEAT.

Conditions Throughout the Country Said to Justify Prediction of \$1 Wheat.

Wheat is Bringing Highest Price Since the Great Leiter Corner.

Flax Does Not Seem to Rally and is Bringing Low Price.

Not since the Leiter deal has wheat sold at such a high price in Jamestown. Today wheat is quoted at 74 cents per bushel in the local market. A number of people believe that wheat will go still higher. The reports from the different states are unfavorable and there seems to be no reason why the long expected \$1 per bushel for wheat should not be secured this fall.

Flax seems to be on the down grade and no one is able to tell just why this should be the case. There is no certainty that there will be a large crop in the northwest. The North Dakota crop report gave it out that the flax situation was unfavorable and the condition of the crop situation in other states is discouraging. Flax is quoted at 87 cents in the local market. Flour has advanced to some extent

as a result of the high price of wheat. A surprisingly large amount of wheat was held over from last fall by the farmers and was marketed lately. Nearly all the farmers have wheat or some other grain to sell, evidencing that they were not greatly in need of money last fall.-Alert.
