Mayville, July 17.—The flax fibre plant was entirely destroyed here this afternoon, making a loss of about \$60,000. Among the property destroyed was fifteen carloads of the finished product ready for shipment to Niagara Falls, and 3,800 tons flax fiber which was being worked up. All buildings were totally consumed, as they were far away for the hose to reach them. The Mayville hospital was threatened, but was saved by the firemen.

Your cup and saucer were of the very best china. It costs something to make that coffee, and we have to get some return on our investment in the silverware and china. There are two cups of coffee in a small pot, and we would lose money if we sold it at 10 cents a cup."

"There is another thing you must consider—when you go into a high class cafe you are given a table by yourself. No matter how badly we are crowded no one is placed at the table with you.
