Instead of the land being a blessing to the Indians it looks more like a curse as less of it is cultivated today than eighteen years ago and the Indians seem to be in worse shape today despite the fact that the government has expended hundreds of thousands of dollars for the betterment of their condition during that time. Here lies some over 600 quarter sections of land outside of the Indian allotments and not a foot of it is cultivated and never vill be as long as it is left to the Indians to do, while if it was opened to settlement it would be only a few years before it would be as productive as any land in the state.—Langdon Re publican.


