AN UNEXPECTED SUMMONS

**Julia Blocker Dies Suddenly in
a Local Hospital.**

Julia Blocker, the 19 year old daugh-
ter of Mr. and Mrs. John Blocker,
Cooperstown, died in a local hospital
yesterday evening as a result of sep-
ticemia. The remains were taken in
charge by the Luger Furniture and
Undertaking Co., and accompanied by
the bereaved father, were taken to
Cooperstown this morning for burial.

Miss Blocker came to Fargo a num-
ber of days ago suffering with some in-
ternal trouble and was taken to the
hospital, where she was operated on.
The operation was a success, but blood
poisoning set in and despite the efforts
of the attending physicians she passed
peacefully away last evening about 5
o'clock. The father was at the bed-
side when the end came. Miss Blocker
has been an invalid for some time
and the operation was resorted to as a
heroic measure and as a last chance to
save her life. She was a bright young
lady and had a host of friends at her
home town, who will be pained to hear
of her sudden summons.—Forum.

The news of Miss Blocker's death
was a surprise to her many friends
here, it having been reported that she
was recovering. The funeral took place
from the Lutheran church Tuesday
afternoon, Rev. E. T. Silness officiat-
ing. The remains were interred in the
Cooperstown cemetery. The many

family extend to them sympathy in
this hour of sad affliction.
