The problem has troubled many why

two pieces of wood sawed from the same section of a tree should posses very varied characteristics when used in different positions. For example, a gate post will be found to decay much faster if the butt end of the tree is uppermost than would be the case i the top were placed in this position. The reason is that the moisture of the atmosphere will permeate the pores of the wood much more rapidly the way the tree grew than it would if in the opposite direction.

Microscopical examination proves that the pores invite the ascent of moisture, while they repel its descent. Take the familiar case of a wooden bucket. Many may have noticed that some of the staves appear to be entirely sat urated, while others are apparently quite dry. This arises from the same cause—the dry staves are in the post tion in which the tree grew, while the saturated ones are reversed.
