Handling 100,000 would require over 2 cents to pay expenses. 200,000 would only leave \$1200 to pay 500 interest on cost of house and \$700 profits. It is an actual fact that the per cent of profit in handling grain is the smallest of any business carried on today. Big profits only come from handling immense quantities, mixing grades, drying wet grain and a close watch of the market. The fact that cash wheat sometimes sells at a premium is no argument to prove big margins. The only safe way to buy grain is to sell same by wire and take quoted prices.
