The official figures of receipts and shipments of grain are public property, readily obtainable by anyone upon application.

The country elevators, however, have smarted under the odium thrown upon them by the McCumber charges, which were rather sweeping and not quite definate. As a result of this, a number of communications have passed between Minneapolis and draw out the fact that the McCumber charges were intended to apply to terminal companies only and not to country elevator companies.

DIRECTED AT TERMINALS. Speaking of the matter this morning, H. F. Douglas, the Minneapolis elevator man, whose interests lie largely in country houses, said:

"In the United States senate, on March 30, Senator McCumber of North Dakota, in a speech urging the passage of his bill for federal inspection, made the charge that the farmers were being robbed by the elevator men of millions of dollars every year in the matter of grades and weights.


