The postoffice department calls attention to the fact that private postal cards are contrary to law. and that those who have or intend in the future to use them must refrain from so doing. The following instructions have been received from Third Assistant Postmaster General Madden. "The law officer for this department advises that cards issued by private persons bearing on the address the words "United States of America," are in 'like ness or similitude" of the regular United States postal card, are therefore in violation of law and unmailable, (Sec. 1591, postal laws and regulations.) However, in order to give owners of such cards reasonable time to dispose of those on hand, postmasters will accept them for mailing until July, 1, 1904, upon payment of postage at the proer rate. Un and after July 1904, such cards will be treated as unmailable at any rate of
