The wolves of the Russian forests devour about 300 human beings yearly.

CURE OF INFANTILE PALSY.

Satisfactory Results of New Nerve-Grafting Method Cause Talk in Surgical World.

A cure of infantile palsy by grafting or splicing the nerves in a child's leg has been effected by a Philadelphia surgeon, Dr. James K. Young, according to dispatches printed in the daily papers. In the operation, as described, the dead portion of a nerve on one side of the leg was removed and the remaining part carried across and spliced into the corresponding branch on the opposite side, in which an incision had been made for the purpose. Says the New York Sun: "The operation occupied just ten minutes, and only a few drops of blood were shed. The patient had suffered no perceptible shock. A plaster cast was placed about the child's leg. Then began the tedious wait for the result, which could mean so much for the child and for the surgical world at large."

"About a month after the operation there gathered in one of the hospital wards a number of representative surgeons. They had been told of the experiment and were anxious to see its result. Carefully the case was cut loose, the bandages removed. 'Move your foot, little one,' said Dr. Young.

"Slowly but surely the foot obeyed the impulse of its owner, moved back and forth where before it had lain helpless. The child has continued to gain strength until now there is no longer a doubt that the grafting of back much of the retarded energy which seemed to doom the affected member to a life of inactivity. The foot will probably never be quite so good as the other, and Dr. Young claims only partial success for the experiment, but the result indicates that progress may be made in this line.

"The former method of treating infantile palsy, and one which is still in vogue with many eminent surgeons all over the world, is the transplanting of muscles or tendons. In this operation an active muscle is transplanted into one that is paralyzed. Sometimes it is successful.

"Owing to the newness of the nerve-grafting system, the conservative surgeons who have witnessed the operation hesitate to speculate too enthusiastically upon the extent it may reach in the treatment of all forms of paralysis. Even Dr. Young admits he is not so sure that every phase of palsy may be successfully treated by the grafting of nerves, but says that the discovery extends hope to those sufferers who before have been considered incurable."

The French-Canadians are overrunning the eastern part of the United States, but they have not attracted attention because they have taken no part in general politics. They have driven the Irish out of the mills.

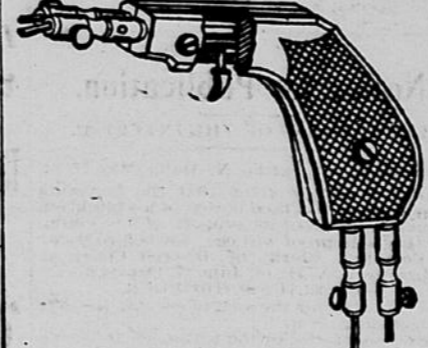
Growth of Rice Industry.

DEVICE FOR CAUTERIZING.

It Consists of an Easily-Handled Electrical Instrument of Revolver Shape.

We show herewith a simple form of electric switch which will facilitate the use of electricity for cauterizing purposes, particularly in the nostrils, mouth and throat. This instrument is arranged somewhat in the form of a revolver, so that it can be conveniently held in the hand. The current may be turned on or off at will by pressing the trigger. From our illustration it will be observed that the trigger forms one arm of a bell crank, whose other arm, when the trigger is operated, serves to press a

contact spring into engagement with the contact plate, thereby closing the circuit to one of the cauterizing wires, the other being normally connected to the battery. The cauterizing wires are held in binding posts and can be readily removed and replaced by wires of different shape and size when desired. The construction and shape of the instrument is such that it will not interfere with the operator's view when performing the cauterizing operation. — Scientific American.

Consumption of Petroleum.

For two years the oil consumption of the world has exceeded the production. The stock of crude Pennsylvania petroleum above ground in December, 1900, was 13,174,717 barrels, while in December, 1902, the amount thus stored was only 5,699,127 barrels. Pennsylvania has the greatest American oil field.

Heart Disease in Prussia.

The Prussian war department finds that in every 1,000 young men arriving at the age of military duty, 17 are suffering from heart diseases. Stricker, who has been studying the subject, declares that the cause of the great prevalence is the increasing degeneracy and nervousness of the youth of the land.

Machine That Sews Buttons.

The sewing of buttons on shoes and on garments is no longer done by hand in modern factories. There is a machine that sews 5,300 buttons on garments in nine hours—or more than eight expert sewers could possibly do in the same time. This machine requires no expert operator. A boy or girl runs it.

Liquefaction of Gelatin.

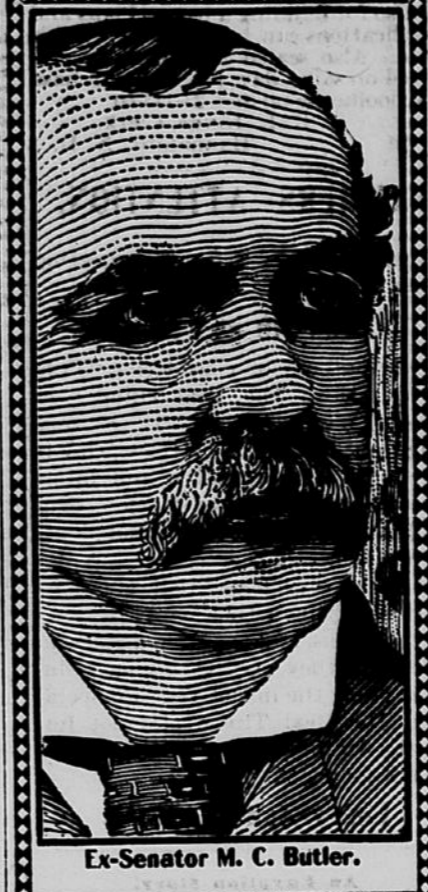
The liquefaction of gelatin in old canned meats has been found by Dr. Grisoni to be due to bacteria. As animals were poisoned both by injection and feeding, he concludes that canned meats that splash on being shaken are dangerous unless boiled before use.

The Largest Sewing Machine.

The largest sewing machine in the world weighs five and a quarter tons. It is used in Leeds, England, for making leather belting. It has two needles, each 13 inches long, and two shuttles about the size of small rowboats. It will sew leather three inches in thickness.
