### The Story of Fabio Romani.

The only authorized dramatic version of Marie Corelli's celebrated tragic story, "Fabio Romani," will be presented at the Opera House, on Friday, Aug. 19. The play follows the famous story closely, with only such necessary changes as the exigencies of the stage demand.

Fabio Romani, last of a long and illustrious race, has recently wedded a young and lovely wife, who with his bosom friend Guido, fill the measure of his life with happiness, unknown to him, his wife is fickle and his friend is false.

The play opens on the shore of the beautiful Bay of Naples at the close of the 15th century. A plague of deadly nature is raging in Naples and noble and common alike are carried off by the scourge. At the beginning, an obscure retainer of Count Romani, is stricken with the dread disease. All shun him and it remains for the Count to nurse him.

The Count catches the plague, though in a mild form and can be saved. Guido, the false friend, interferes with those who proffer assistance and lets the Count die as every appearance indicates. The remains of Fabio are carried in due state to the ancient family mausoleum. The tomb is sealed and the countess and her lover are alone. Fabio is not dead, however. During the night in the tomb he revives. In attempting to climb from the sepulchre, he piles coffins one on another. One of them falls and reveals immense wealth. Fabio succeeded in escaping from the vault and carries with him much of the treasure.

He rushes home to find his wife in her lover's arms. Then Count Romani is heard of no more. In his stead arises a spirit of vengeance in the guise of a foreigner with snow white hair and enormous wealth. He pays assiduous court to his supposed widow and wins her away from Guido. To Guido he proclaims himself and in the duel which follows, kills his false friend.

The Countess still in ignorance of the truth, does Fabio's bidding. He takes her to the tomb of the Romani and there makes known his identity. The shock dethrones her reason. At this point Mt. Vesuvius belches forth, burying the tomb and the last of the Romani.
