Hannaford.

The most of us, especially those who have dwelt long in this vale of tears, have had the experience of being entertained in homes of refinement and culture. Have been in families who were "nice" in every sense of the word. And in some of those same families, we have met a boy who was in every sense of the word "A holy terror," and as we have watched the waves of mortification sweep over the mother's face, as she apologized for "Freddy," and his naughtiness, we have been filled with a desire to take the young man across our laps and apply the palm of our hands to that portion of his anatomy calculated to receive the most punishment, with the least shock to the brain.

The Hannaford Republican Club and a portion of her business men, find themselves in the same position. We welcomed the advent of a paper in our midst, as marking a distinct step in our progress.
