Another Pioneer Gone.

Mrs. Isabelle Homme, wife of S. O. Homme passed quietly away in the slumber of death last Friday morning at 8 o'clock after a prolonged illness of several months.

Mrs. Homme had been failing in health for the last four years and sought medical aid in various places. In spite of the best efforts to restore her to health she finally succumbed to death through tuberculosis. She leaves husband and two children to mourn her departure.

Mrs. Homme was a quiet unpretentious woman, possessed of good judgment and intelligence. She was a faithful worker in her home as well as in the church. She bore with her husband the burden of pioneer life and experienced many hardships which are so common to early settlers. The deceased came to North Dakota with her husband 22 years ago where they settled on their present homestead, five miles east of town.

Mrs. Homme was born 45 years ago in Goodhue Co., Minn., and is the daughter of Svein Nordgarden and Torbjorg, both of whom have died within the last two years, and the fifth member of the family who have died within two years.

The remains were interred in the Sheyenne Valley Lutheran cemetery and followed by a great number of friends and relatives. Rev. E. T. Silness officiated at the house and the cemetery.

District Court.

The fall term wound up Wednesday of last week. There was very little done at this term.

In the case of State vs. Tande the jury brought in a verdict of not guilty. This was a murder charge. A. M. Baldwin and Lee Combs defended and States Attorney Tufte prosecuted.

J. L. Jackson was placed under bonds to keep the peace, \$500 being the sum named or on default of bonds six months in jail. Jackson was complained against by Editor Curry, of Binford, who claimed that defendant threatened to burn up his property.

Jack O'Meara, who threatened E. Marquardt, was turned loose. He is dead now. Found drowned in Ball Hill creek.

Case of Little vs. Wm. Saar, suit against the administrator of an estate, judgment was rendered for Little in the sum of \$282.50 and costs. Attorney Combs for Little, Attorney Gladstone for Saar.

Case Drittenboss vs. Frank Ressler, suit for slander, defendant filed demurrer to complaint on the ground that complaint did not state a charge that constituted a criminal offence. Demurrer sustained, and time was given to plaintiff to amend. The case went over to next term. Attorney Spicer for plaintiff, Attorney Tufte for defence.

Two tax cases went over to next term.

Court adjourned.

Found Dead.

The body of John O'Meara, the man who was turned loose by the judge at the term of district court last week, was found dead in Bald Hill Creek last Friday night by one of the section men at Hannaford. The body was brought to Cooperstown Sunday and an inquest held by Coroner Bergstrom Monday, a jury consisting of Messrs. J. H. McDermott, Wm. Glass and C. J. Lucken were empanelled. The jury returned a verdict of accidental drowning. O'Meara had been confined in the county jail for some time prior to district court for threatening to kill Emil Marquardt. It was generally considered that he was demented. The court however turned him loose with the understanding that he leave the state. He left town but it seems he started back to this place last Friday but did not get further than the creek where his body was discovered face down in ten inches of water. No marks of violence were found on him and he apparently died without a struggle. It might have been suicide or it might have been intoxication but it certainly is peculiar that a man should drown without a struggle. His father, Wm. O'Meara, lives at Marquette, Mich., and telegraphed to have the body shipped to Superior where he would meet the remains. Coroner Bergstrom went with the body Tuesday afternoon.

Alexander's Horse.

Bucephalus, the horse of Alexander the Great, was in all probability the most celebrated horse of which we have any knowledge. He was bought for the sum of 16 talents from Philonicus out of his breeding pastures of Pharsalla, and it is known that he was skewbald, or, in other words, white, clouded with large deep bay spots, this peculiar breed being valued by the Parthians above all others, but being disliked by the Romans because so easily seen in the dark.

Bucephalus was ridden by Alexander at the battle of the Hydaspes and there received his death wound. Disobedient for once to the command of his master, he galloped from the heat of the battle, brought Alexander to a place of safety, knelt, as was his custom, for him to alight and, having thus performed his duty, trembled, dropped down and died.
