A U. S. Senator is to be elect ed in January by the legislature to succeed Senator McCumber. The Courier believes that the people of this district desire to see Mr. McCumber returned. He has made the state an able representative in the senate and is alive to the best interests of the people he represents.


President Roosevelt's majority in North Dakota is nearly forty thousand, or double as much majority as Parker's total vote in the state. This is going some all right. Governor Sarles got over 31,000 majority which shows that the popularity of his op ponent did not cut much of a figure in the recent unpleasantness-for the other fellows.

A movement is on foot to have a bill introduced in the legislature compelling railroads to give a passenger a seat or no pay. This is a measure that is just anyway. When a person buys a ticket to ride on the cars he should be furnished a comfortable seat. Standing gets monotonous and the crowded conditions of many of the main line trains very often compel people to stand up. `

Hon. John S. Palfrey of Steele county was in the city last Monday, conferring with some of his Griggs county constituents. Mr. Palfrey is of the opinion that a good primary election law will be passed at the coming session of the legislature and is in favor of a measure governing all elective officers-which is the only measure to pass. We might as well have no primary bill as to have one only governing part of the elective offices.

Judge Pollock's recent decis ion in a blind pig case that recently came up before him at Fargo has knocked the props from under the vendors of "tame moose," "malt cream" and other favorite beverages that have been giving people that joyful feeling. The Judge claims that it is not necessary to have 2 per cent. alcohol in the stuff now it does not require any per cent. just so long as the stuff intoxicates that is sufficient. Judge Pollock's decision is a big boost for the prohibitionists and a hard blew to those who have been dealing in these various beverages with the view of evading the laws of this state. The COURIER hopes that the judge will be sustained and that other Judges in the state will fall into line and do their duty.

Congressman Spaulding has introduced a bill in the national house of representatives providing for a Tariff Commission. He says: "Whereas the country has been pledged a readjustment of the tariff schedules when needed; and whereas the present rate of duties upon imports have been in force seven years and during such time conditions have materially changed, rendering duties on some article unnecessary and on others harmful, while on some commodities not now protected protective duties may be beneficial." Mr. Spaulding wants a commission of nine members appointed-a permament commission—whose duties shall be to revise the tariff and report to congress. The bill carries with it a salary attachment of \$5000 per year and expenses. This will give the president nine very nice positions to fill if the bill becomes a law. No members of congress can be ap-
