

# SEN. McCUMBER NOMINATED

Hon. P. J. McCumber the Junior Senator from North Dakota, is Unanimously Re-nominated

## IN THE LEGISLATIVE CAUCUS LAST NIGHT

Placed in Nomination by Senator Movius of Richland Co. and the Nomination Seconded by Buttz of Ransom--Senator McCumber Receives the Solid Vote of the Caucus--the Formal Ballot will be Taken on January 18.

BISMARCK, N. D., Jan. 2.—Senator McCumber was tonight chosen as the nominee of the republican party of the state for re-election as United States Senator.

Senator McCumber was placed in nomination by Senator Movius of Richland county and the nomination was seconded by Buttz of Ransom county. His was the only name presented. He received the solid vote of the caucus.

Senator Crane of Griggs coun-

ty, and Senator McDonald of Emmons county, both republicans, were absent from the caucus.

After the nomination, Senator McCumber was escorted to the hall where the caucus was held and made a brief address pledging his best efforts for the state and expressing his gratitude for the choice of the caucus.

The formal ballot will be taken in the legislature on January 15.

# OLD GUARD IN SENATE

EFFORTS OF INSURGENTS FAILED IN UPPER HOUSE

The Senate Will be Organized on the Same Basis as in Former Years—Twenty-four Members Have Signed—Crane Heads Insurgents.

BISMARCK, Jan. 2.—When the senate convenes on Tuesday the old guard will still be in the saddle and will have as complete control over it organization as ever. The much talked of majority of the "insurgents" failed to materialize and the organization will be along the same lines as in prior years. The organization as completed on Sunday evening was signed up to by twenty-four of the members of the senate thus insuring a safe majority. Nothing can now prevent the slate as arranged from going through. Senator LaMoure will get his accustomed place as chairman of the committee on appropriations and Senator Little will be chairman of the judiciary committee.
