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

Red Wing is one of the many old, historical [and beautiful towns which are found along the Mississippi river. We left here some 28 years ago, but we can't see that it had any disastrous effect upon the growth of the city or its business. In fact it has been growing steadily ever since and while formerly it was a purely agricultural region, today the river banks are lined with manufacturing industries, principal among which are the Red Wing can Sewer and Pipe Co., a close corporation which pays its stockholders an annual dividend of 40 per cent. Needless to say the stock is not for sale. At Zumbrota we had a very pleasant visit with Scott Vandebogart, who is comfortably situated on a 220 acre farm one mile from town Scott evidently has no vain regrets for life in Dakota, finding the varied farming more pleasurable and just as profitable. Farmers were particularly fortunate in this locality last year, their wheat yielding 20 bu to the acre and bringing from 1.04 to 1.11 per bushel. The elevator men also have an easy time of it. There is no chewing the rag over grading, it all goes for No. 2 and the top price. The elevator man keeps even however by docking the wheat according to quality, poor grades being docked up to 10lbs or more. The local demand for barley makes a fine market for it; it bringing 37 to 42c per bushel. We spent so much time and lost so much sleep in endeavoring to blow out the electric light last night that we feel disposed to retire early.
