PASSED THE SENATE.

The Sharpe primary election bill passed the state senate last Thursday by a vote of 34 to 4 The bill covers every elective office in the state from United States senator down. The large vote on the passage of the measure would indicate that the "old gang" were not opposed to it in a marked degree as the vote was almost unanimous. It is thought that it will go through the house right away.

The patent medicine men claim that if this bill becomes a law they will have to stop advertising in the weekly papers. This statement will not only be hailed with delight by the suffering public who have to read every week of "Untold Agonies, cured by two bottles,' but by the newspaper men who are bothered to death by agents to advertise these medicines for almost nothing. REGULATING AUTOS.



The COURIER believes that it is the duty of the legislature to pass a measure regulating the speed and conditions of running the horseless carriages, at the same time the law should be fair and just. This is an age of progress and the auto, electric car, airships and all these modern methods of locomotion have come to stay and farmers as well as teams will become used to them in time. People have got to get used to these new conditions and improvements. The auto certainly is a frightful thing to many teams and much damage can be done by reckless and unscrupulous drivers. It is only right and necessary that fair and proper restrictions be placed upon owners of autos but the measure should also read that the auto should have its right of way along the highways as well as the driver of teams. We have a few hogs dressed in men's clothes who refuse to give the auto half of the road as a conse quence these fellows usually get into trouble. If the driver of teams will be fair in this matter we think the man with the auto will also tote fair and less trouble result. Many men will deliberately drive right up to an approaching auto without making an effort to turn out and then before they know it they are in the ditch, when they have had plenty of time to pull to one side and escape trouble. These are what are termed smart Alecks and deserve what they got.
