### Scale Inspection.

The Following Gives a Synopsis of the New Scale Inspection Law.

The New Law is Compulsory and They Can Test Your Scales Twice a Year.

Hon. D. B. Wellman, the new inspector of weights and measures, is reported by the state press from time to time in various parts of the state, selecting deputies and preparing for the beginning of work upon the inspection of weights and measures. Mr. Wellman was recently in Chicago conferring with the sealer of weights and measures and familiarizing himself with the duties of his office. Under the new law, the duties of the inspector are to inspect and examine at least once in six months all weights, measures and other instruments used for weighing and selling any commodity sold by weight and measure within the state. The inspector or deputy has power to test any and all scales at any time, but shall not collect fees oftener than twice in any one year. For inspecting railroad and track scales of the capacity of twenty tons and upwards, the inspector's fee is \$3; for scales from 3 to 20 tons capacity, \$2; for sealing dormant scales, \$1; movable platform scales, 50c; counter scales, 25c. The inspectors fees for inspecting liquid measures range from 10c to 25c, according to the size of the measure inspected. The standard of weights and measures adopted is the standard adopted by the government of the United States. A fine of \$50 is imposed upon any person who uses scales or weights not conforming to the standard adopted by the state or altering a weight or measure after it has been sealed. Sealers of weights and measures may seize without warrant any weight or measure necessary to be used as evidence in case of violation of the law, and they may be returned to the owner or forfeited as the court may desire.

### ELECTRIC LIGHTS.

For the one-hundredth time the subject of an electric light plant is again agitating Cooperstown business men and the matter is again being sifted to the bottom with a view to getting a plant. E. H. Ackerman, of Minneapolis, an electrician, has been here for a few days getting our citizens interested in the matter and is trying to form a stock company. He offers to take a \$1,000 worth of stock himself. Chet Platt is also interested and offers to furnish the power for the plant. It is proposed by him to build a dam on the river at his place and furnish water power which would insure an all night service. He claims to have sufficient water to furnish the power. The Commercial Club held a meeting Monday night and discussed the proposition and it was decided that if \$4,000 or \$5,000 worth of stock could be raised it would be a go, so that a committee of three composed of H. P. Hammer, John Syverson and J. L. Houghton were appointed to solicit stock, so that the question of an electric light plant now hinges on the one thing—can enough stock be secured.

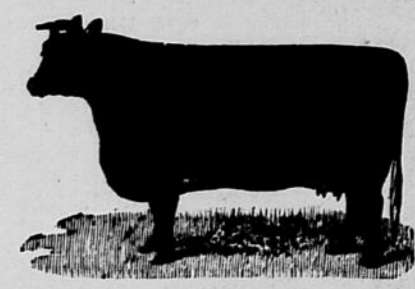

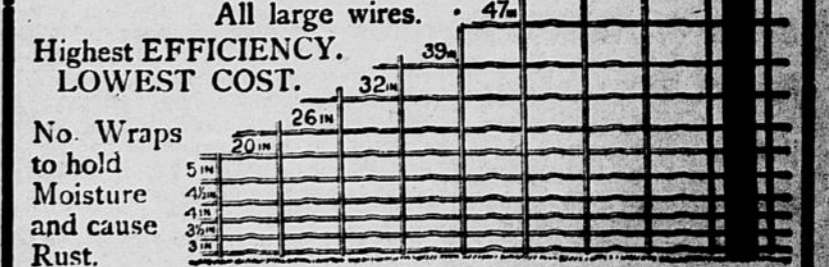
