THE JAMESTOWN TOURNAMENT.

The members of the Cooperstown Fire Department who attended the tournament at Jamestown last week returned on Friday and Saturday mornings bringing scalps galore.

Included in the team was the base ball club which on Friday evening in a close and interesting game added to Cooperstown laurels by defeating Jamestown by a score of 2 to 1.

The people of Jamestown exerted themselves to the utmost to see that all were accorded a warm reception and given an entertaining week and succeeded so well that all left with the most kindly feelings towards the citizens of Jamestown. Tuesday was directed to the regular work of the convention Minot being selected as the place of meeting for next year. On Wednesday morning the various fire companies represented paraded and in this Cooperstown easily won first place, the Lidgerwood company taking the second prize. In the afternoon the home boys won the first place in both the Association Hook and Ladder race and the Hub and Hub giving them for the day two speaking trumpets and \$70 in cash prizes. Thursday morning the remaining races were run on one of the residence streets the rain of Wednesday night having spoiled the tournament course. This morning Cooperstown won first place in the service test and in the combination race, and first, second, and third in the ladder climbing contest, adding \$55 in cash prizes to this of the previous day. The boys in red not only by the racing but by their general conduct won a high place in the regard of the people of Jamestown and the feeling was increased by the ball boys. The game on Friday morning was undoubtedly one of the most enjoyable of any played in the state and this was due to the good feeling that prevailed between spectators and players. Rooting there was in plenty but of a good humored sportsman-like kind and good plays on either side brought forth hearty applause from all. The ball team on Saturday went to Bismarck to play in the afternoon but were compelled to return without a game owing to rain.
