SUDDEN DEATH.

August Steinborn, an Old Griggs County Pioneer is Stricken by Apoplexy While at Work in the Field.

Word was received in Cooperstown last Friday afternoon of the sudden demise of an old settler of this county, Mr. August Steinborn, cause of death resulting from a stroke of apoplexy. It seems that the deceased was feeling very well on the morning of last Friday. He went out into the harvest field with his son and was helping around the binder when he suddenly complained of dizziness and sickness. He lay down and told his son to go another round and thought he would feel better but instead grew rapidly worse and the son went to the house to get the buggy to take him home and he had lapsed into unconsciousness when he was put into the buggy and ever spoke again, dying at the house at a few minutes after 1 o'clock. It was about noon when he was stricken. Deceased was an old pioneer citizen of this county and had many friends who regret to hear of his death. He was born in Germany Feb.

24, 1847 and was married June 3, 1869, being a little over 58 years old at his death. He came to the United States in the spring of 1881, locating at Cleveland, O., and in 1883 moved to Griggs county, where he had resided up to the time of his death. There had been thirteen children born to the Steinborns, only seven of them now living, as follows. Mrs. John Francis, Fred, Annie, Charley, Herbert, Mable (Mrs. Wells) and George. The funeral was held last Sunday, at the farm home, Rev. Dorkop, of Valley City, conducting the ceremonies. The remains were laid to rest in the Cooperstown cemetery. Mr. Steinborn's death removes a pioneer settler—one who roughed it all through the hard times. He had amassed quite a little fortune and it is too bad that he was not allowed to live to enjoy it. Life is uncertain and each one has to answer the summons of the grim reaper whenever it comes.
