Illinois View of North Dakota.

The Springfield, Ill., Journal has this to say of North Dakota: One who visits North Dakota for the first time is seldom prepared for the advanced stages of progress in agriculture, stock raising and manufacturing industries which greet his mind and eye. It is to often the case that he has preconceived notions of crudity, undeveloped resources, barren plains, possibly cabins distantly separated, few educational advantages, cities and towns of the wild and woolly west description of the dime novel character. Surprise is usually written upon the face of the visitor to that new but enterprising state. As the facts presents themselves to him he is struck with amazement and wonders how he ever became possessed of such false ideas. A trip over this state reveals to him, magnificently producing fields, beautiful prairies a population of the world's best citizens, who are active and progressive, ever striving to develop the rich and inexhaustible resources of one of the best states in the western portion of the United States. As the writer passed through the state last month he was greeted by smiling fields of waving grain, countless herds of cattle, horses and sheep. He saw fields of wheat ranging from one hundred and sixty to five thousand acres in a body. This wheat when marketed grades number one and he was informed that it brought the highest market price. He saw magnificent fields of barley, rye, flax, speltz, alfalfa, millet, timothy, clover and corn. It demonstrated to him that a wrong impression prevailed about corn. They raise fine corn in North Dakota and it is asserted that this crop becomes larger each year. North Dakota will this year, produce more wheat than any state in the United States, with the possible exception of Kansas. According to the census of 1900 the state ranked second in the per capita production of oats. Iowa alone having a higher rank. The average yield per acre of barley since 1901 has been 29.4 bushels, compared with an average for the United States of 27.1. During the past four year the United States has produced 105,985,000 bushels of flax seed, of which 54,825,000 bushels or 52 per cent. were grown in North Dakota. Every crop raised in this state, except corn, shows an average yield for 1905 greater than the average yield for the United States.

North Dakota has within its confines about three million acres of government land waiting for the homesteader. Most of this land is fertile and will produce as many bushels of any kind of grain sown as any land found in the west. It is free to all who have not previously exercised their rights. This is a golden opportunity and one which should impress itself upon the renter or small landowners.

No state in the union presents so many and varied opportunities to the poor man, investor or capitalist as North Dakota does today. It offers a home to the poor, it gives the investor a chance to double, treble and probably quadruple his money. It has so many openings for the capitalist that they are past enumerating. To the young man with small capital and plenty of energy it offers inducements that no other state can claim. To the renter it breaks the shackles and releases him from the everlasting grind and endless toil without proper recompense for his labor.

Why rent in view of these facts? The renter gives his time and labor for the benefit of others, when in North Dakota he can obtain land at low prices or can take up a homestead which

will more than pay \$10 an acre net, if sown to flax, wheat, oats or corn.

Are you living on a rented farm? Have you teams and farming implements? By all means move to North Dakota and get a farm of your own and in a few years you can become worth more money than you can make in a life time here. The improvement you make on your farm will be your own.

All farmers with large families and moderate means can do better in that country than in any region in the United States. Those who have mortgaged homes and are yearly working to pay the interest, would far better sell and go west and buy anew from what they can save out of the wreck. What is the use of constant toil for the benefit of others? Go west and go to work for yourself. Any young farmer who can control from \$500 to \$1,000 can grow into independence there in a few years. Those who have stock and machinery, but no land, can go there and buy a home from profits of the first year's season. One crop will often more than pay for the land. The industrious and sober men are the aristocrats of North Dakota. They become the men of wealth and influence.

North Dakota will exhibit samples of grains produced in the state at the Illinois state fair, and those interested or those who desire information regarding soil, prices of land, location of government land, general resources of the state, can obtain it from W. C. Gilbreath, commissioner of agriculture of North Dakota, or his assistants, who are thoroughly conversant with the state in detail.

The county commissioners of Foster county recently passed resolutions endorsing the work of the sheriff and states attorney for getting after the bootleggers who are running all over the country selling liquor. They further say that they will spare no expense to land all of these law breakers even to going to the expense of hiring detectives. This is a step in the right direction and if carried out by the other counties in the state, this would be a very unhealthy place for bootleggers to live in.

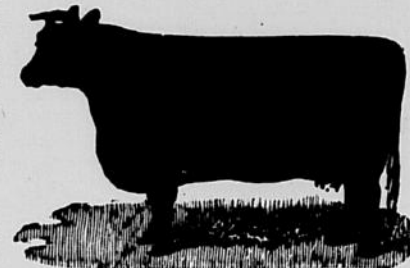

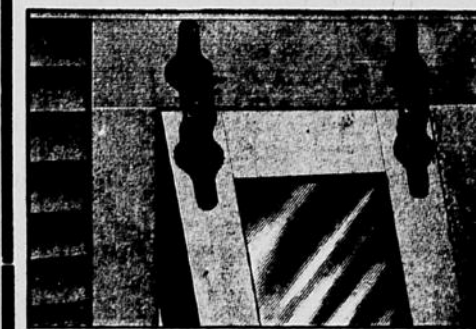
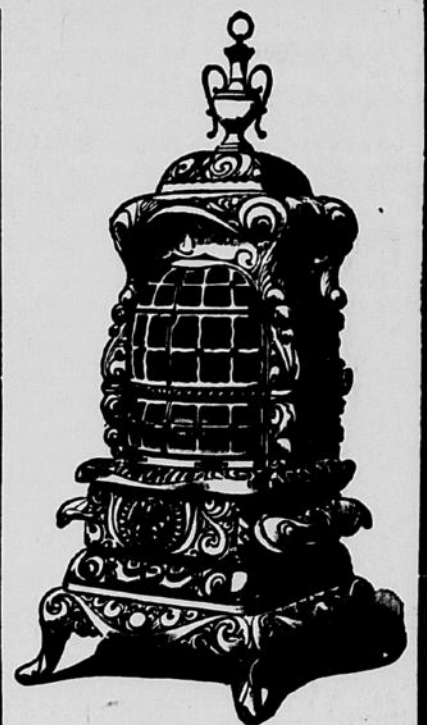
