### Would Like to Be There.

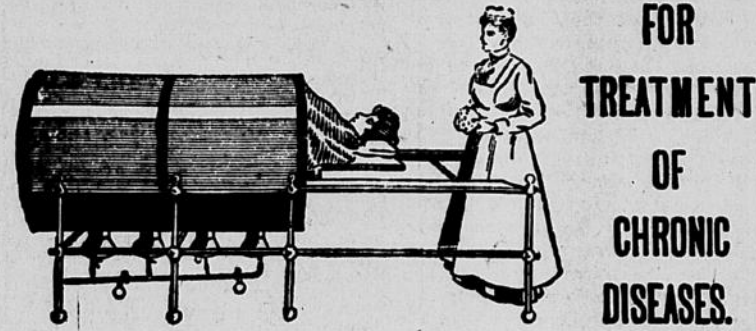
