A Great Teachers' Meeting.

If present plans carry, the teachers of the state will have the biggest meeting at Grand Forks December 27-29 in the history of the North Dakota Educational society.

There is scarcely a big man or woman educator in the state whose name does not appear somewhere on the various programs—and the topics are alive and up-to-date.

There will be some speakers from outside the state, well known to the educational public.

The state association is growing more aggressive every year in its efforts to secure just treatment and adequate pay for the teachers, as the action of the last legislature plainly showed. It has a right therefore to demand the loyal support of every teacher in the state.

Other state associations have prepaid membership, i. e., every teacher of the state is asked to contribute the dollar membership fee toward the support of the association—whether the teacher can attend or not. It is proposed to adopt a similar plan in this state this year. The teacher who feels he can't go to Grand Forks December 27, 28 and 29 should be represented by his membership fee. The fee should be sent to A. P. Hollis, Valley City, N. D., secretary of the association. It will entitle the contributor to the associa-

tion. It will entitle the contributor to the association badge and the printed Volume of Proceedings, which is alone worth the fee.

All the teachers of the state ought to see the state university and other interesting places at Grand Forks. The citizens are planning a reception to the visiting teachers. There will be special rates on all railroads.

Among the speakers before the general sessions will be State Superintendent W. L. Stockwell, President Joseph Carhart, president of the association; President J. H. Worst, of the State Agricultural College; Bishop Mann, of Fargo; President E. G. Burch, of the State Science School at Wahpeton; Superintendent J. M. Kelley, of Grand Forks; Professor A. P. Hollis, of the Valley City State Normal school; Professor Waldron, of Fargo, Superintendent Dewar, of Devils Lake; Miss Sara L. Roberts, primary critic in the Model school at Valley City, and President H. N. Wells, of the Department of Administration. Many other educators of equal rank will address the various departmental sections.
