Some "Bloated Bondholders."

The semi-annual payment of interest on registered United States bonds, which occurs in January and June, is now being made. While it is very difficult to obtain exact information as to the largest receivers of interest from this class of United States bonds, yet, like almost anything else here, it can be had if one

United States bonds, yet, like almost anything else here, it can be had if one wants it badly enough. This year the largest single bondholder the treasury department knows of is Mr. Vanderbilt, who will receive the interest on \$27,000,000. A year ago he had \$50,000,000, but he has disposed of \$13,000,000 for some purpose. The next largest owner is Mrs. A. T. Stewart, who has about \$30,000,000. As some of hers are coupon bonds, the amount of her holding cannot exactly be told. Ten years ago Mr. A. T. Stewart had \$40,000,000 in bonds, the most of them being 6's. Mr. Gould has \$13,000,000 in registered bonds and a large number of coupon bonds, which he keeps to use as collaterals in Wall street when he needs large sums of money. A California millionaire, Mr. Flood is the next largest holder. He has \$15,000,000. States bonds as permanent investments, but was told that the rate of interest is now so low that other securities are preferred that are considered just as safe and pay higher in erest.

On the other side of the water American securities are very popular and far preferred to those of other nations, because the rate of interest is higher than that paid by any other greater power. The house of the Rothschilds owns nearly one-quarter of America's whole bonded debt, as, including all the bankers of that name, they have \$49,000,000.

Baron Leopold and Sir Nathan Meyer de Rothschild each own \$30,000,000, and the head of the Vienna house has \$25, 900,000 in his own right. The reason I have heard for their putting such extra-ordinary amounts into American bonds is that political and social systems are every day becoming more and more uncertain in Europe, and, therefore, if a general break-up should occur on the Continent or in England, enough would Continent or in England, enough would be left in the securities of the Great Republic to make them all very comfortable indeed, Lady Hannah de Rothschill, who married the Earl of Rosebery a year or two ago, brought to her really impoverished husband \$20,000,000 in American 4 1-2s. I sincerely hope the rather priggish young earl (whose attempts at marrying an American heiress were notorious, and whose treatment of a charmingly clever young lady in New York was outrageous) appreciates his not very handsome but thoroughly good wife without her bonded attractions. Baroness Burdett-Coutts-Bartlett has \$20,000,000 of our 4 1-2 s, the Duke of Suther-000 of our 4 1-2 s, the Duke of Suther-land \$5,000,900, and Sir Thomas Brassy \$5,000,000. I learn that the Queen was asked a year or two ago, when she had some money to invest, if she did not want some United States bonds, and that she declined with more peremptoriness than courtesy.
