A curious experiment has lately been made at Acqui, Italy, by the proprietor. of some baths there. This gentleman has at his disposal an inexhaustible supply of hot water from a natural spring, the temperature being 167 degrees Fahrenheit. The surplus not required for the baths has been diverted so as to flow through pipes to a garden on the outskirts of the town. Here the warm liquid flows beneath a number of forcing frames containing melons, tomatoes, asparagus, and other garden produce. The result is that a supply of these delicacies is ready for market at a very early period of the year, when, therefore, they fetch high prices.

Origin and Progress of Annual Fairs.

Theodore Lyman gave an address at the opening of the Mechanics' Fair in Boston, recently, in the course of which he said: "Over sixty years ago the State of New York established the typical county agricultural fair, a system which has been adopted by the larger number of states, extending to the Rocky Mountains in Colorado in 1874. These fairs have been the great educators of the public in all that relates to agriculture, and are to-day important adjuncts and supports of the many State Agricultural Colleges which have been founded since 1862. Other fairs, more varied and comprehensive than the agricultural, embracing more particularly the much wider range of manufactured products, have been held in some of our larger cities for many years, notably those of this association in Boston, of the Franklin Institute in Philadelphia, of the American Institute in New York, of the Maryland Institute in Baltimore, and also the exhibitions of Chicago, Cincinnati, St. Louis. New Orleans, San Francisco and the Manufacturers Institute of this city. Such local and special fairs and exhibitions as these in this and other countries have culminated in the great international or world's expositions of the past







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
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
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
