The term quarantine is defined as the complete isolation of all diseased or suspected animals from healthy animals. No provision is made for pleuro pneumonia, nor for hogs, for the reason that for the former provision is made in the statute; for the latter it would require an army of veterinary surgeons to investigate cases of diseased hogs, and the expenses would be enormous; and further, nearly all cases of diseased hogs can be traced to bad feeding or keeping.

Windom and Micaragua.

"Ex-Secretary Windom of Minnesota remarked to me," says Gath, "'The Nicaragua treaty is a great departure in the policy of this country. I have not yet made up my mind about its merits. The guaranteeing of the sovereignty of even so small a country is a great departure from the advice of the father of his country, that we avoid entangling alliof his country, that we avoid entangling alliances with any foreign nation.' Speaking of the canal schemes, Mr. Windom said: I am a believer in something entirely different—Capt. Eads's ship-railway project. His proposition a few years ago was that he would construct ten miles of road, with all the appliances for taking a 2,500 ton vessel ou; of the water, running it at a satisfactory rate of speed, and replacing it in the water, thereby demonstrating with his own means the entire practicability of the enterprise, provided the governstrating with his own means the entire practicability of the enterprise, provided the government would thereafter become liable for the 3 per cent interest which he asked, to have guaranteed on \$50,000,000 of bonds, on which money was to be raised to complete the road. This, it seemed to me, was a safe practical proposition, which it would have been wise to accept, as no payments were required at all except on a thorough demonstration of the success of his plan. It seemed to me that with the completion of the road its income would certainly have saved the government from any payment whatever under its guarantee. The proposition also embraced, under authority of concession from Mexico, exceedingly great ad-vantages to the commerce of the United States over the commerce of other nations."
