FARMERS' MEETING.

VALLEY CITY, Jan. 14, 1885.—The principal event of importance here last week was the farmers mass meeting at the court house January 8th. About 500 persons were in attendance, the largest meeting ever held at Valley City. Mayor Weiser was made chairman and Mr. J. Parkhouse, secretary. A committee of six were appointed to act with the committees of other counties to draft a bill for the protection of the wheat producers, the bill to be presented to the legislature for action. The committee consists of F. A. Hanscomb of Oriska, H. O. Sterl, Sanborn, F. H. Remington, Hugh McDonald, Wylie Nelson, and J. Parkhouse, Valley City. The committee consists of men who are enthusiastic and energetic in the good work, and the people can rely upon the drafting of a bill that will remedy their grievances.

Mr. Stevens, of Griggs, will introduce a bill, early in the session, restoring the law relating to carriers to its original strength, prior to the enactments of 1879.

Among others attending the meeting were Messrs. Goodrich and Fancher, of Jamestown; Elliot, of Ransom; Van Wormer, of Sanborn; Remington, Persons, Root, Woodford, Pray, Wolski, Lucas, Wright, Powers and Pickett, of Barnes, besides members of the press.

ALLEGED SEDUCTION. Mr. David Wass was arrested to-night by Deputy Sheriff Millius, upon a charge of seduction under promise of marriage, preferred by one Mary L. Murray. Mr. Wass is a gentleman of sixty, born and raised in the beautiful cobbler-stone region of Tioga county, Pennsylvania, where he acquired a competency by a lucky strike in "oil." SANBORN. Great excitement prevailed on last Monday over the discovery of a four-foot vein of anthracite coal, four miles southwest of Sanborn. It appears that parties have been working it secretly for some time.
