Legislation may mais you, but it will rather be by showing you that it is powerless to reach your wants. You are beyond the reach of all law, except the law of supply and demand.

are beyond the reach of all law, except the law of supply and demand. You must plant and grow timber. It is a duty every citizen of Dakota owes to himself and his country, to grow all the timber he can. It is a mistaken no-tion that some people have, that the people planting will not live to reap any benefit from it. I have planted cuttings of the Lombard, Poplar and Golden Willow, ten years ago, in Michigan, that are to-day thirty and forty feet high and are to-day thirty and forty feet high and six inches in diameter,-large enough for firewood and fencing; and although now fifty-two years of age, were I living here, I should plant and raise all the timber I could, not forgetting many kinds of fruit trees that will do well here, and I should look forward to no distant day of reaping the benefit of it.

And in the next place you want to adopt a system of mixed farming. You must endeavor to raise everything you want to use. Sell what you can spare, and buy nothing you can do without. Do not become possessed of more land than you need to use. You will find more money in a little farm well tilled than in many acres to pay taxes on that you do not use.

Raise sheep, individually, if you can, if not join with your neighbors, and raise them together. The long winters can be well employed in manufacturing their wool into clothing for yourselves. Raise flax for the same purpose.

Encourage manufacturers to establish themselves among you; pay them a bonus when necessary.
