Grow Your Fuel.

Peter C. DeLind, after an experience of some years, gives his views on fuel as a regular crop, to the Dakota Farmer, from which we take the essence thus:

The mammoth Russian sunflower makes the very best kind of fuel. I have been burning "turf" for sixteen years, coal for twelve years, wood for eight years, I prefer the sunflower to anything else. I grow one acre of them every year, and have plenty of fuel for one stove the whole year round, and use some in another stove besides. I plant them in hills the same as corn (only three seeds to a hill), and cultivate the same as corn. I cut them when the leader or top flower is ripe, let them lay two or three days, in that time I cut off all the seed heads, which are put into an open shed with a floor in it, the same as a corn crib, the stalks are then hauled home and packed in a common shed with a roof. When cut in the right time, the stalks when dry are as hard as oak, and make a good hot fire, while the seed heads with the seed, make a better fire than the best hard coal. The seed being very rich in oil it will warm better and burn longer, bushel for bushel, than hard coal. The sunflower is very hard on land, the piece of ground selected should be highly enriched with manures. In the great steppes (prairie) region in the interior of Russia and Tartary, where the winters are more severe than here in Dakota, the sunflowers are, and have been for centuries past, the only kind of fuel used. Land is not scarce yet in Dakota. We can better afford to devote one or two acres of and to grow our supply on, than we can afford to pay double price for coal and double rates of freight on same, meanwhile we plant groves and timber belts for shade, shelter and fuel and as our population increases, industry will increase, and coal will be then brought to light in many places on the great prairies of Dakota.

Worthy of Note.

The code of Dakota furnishes us the following bit of law, and it would be well for not a few to make a note of it, and govern themselves accordingly. "When animals are left hitched in the open air during cold weather or in the night time, they shall be taken care of by an officer and the charges thereof shall be a lien upon the animal, and that upon conviction of any person so leaving them shall pay a fine not to exceed \$25.00.
