Mr. Barnes, member from Kingsbury county, has introduced in the territorial legislature the following as an amendment to penal code, relating to selling liquor to minors, etc.: "Every person found guilty of selling any intoxicating lit is the only line running sleeping cars liquor, by agent or otherwise, to a minor, unless upon written order of parent, guardian or family physician, shall be deemed guilty of a felony, and upon conviction thereof, shall be confined in the territorial penitentiary for not less than one year nor more than two years. Any person who shall sell or give to any person who is intoxicated, or who is in the habit of becoming intoxicated, any intoxicating liquor, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and, upon conviction thereof, shall pay a fine not exceeding one hundred and fifty dollars and not less than twenty

dollars."

There is a bill before the Minnesota legislature which provides "that males and females shall not be allowed to use or occupy the floor of any roller skating rink in this state at the same time, for the purpose of skating." This bill is provoking a good deal of sarcasm and comment as it seems to be purely a proprietary measure. A St. Paul deacon thus unburdens . is mind on the subject: "I have no doubt in my own mind that young people meet at the rinks who should not be thrown together. Acquaintances are easily made, no introductions, but only ability to skate well, being required. Then young fellows and girls go there by appointment to meet each other, and these meetings, I have reason to know, are not always for good purposes. Then, the girls at the rink fall down and the young men tumble over them, and this sort of thing can't go on without breeding undue familiarity, and blunting the edge of modesty. There are always a lot of mashers about, too, whose only object in being there is to capture a victim of the other

The language of the proposed law indicates that it is based alone upon propriety, and it was probably introduced by a bald headed member from a Quaker district.
