The Fire Fiend

VISITS BISMARCK, AND CONSUMES THE TRIBUNE BUILDING, TOGETHER WITH POSTOFFICE AND OTHER PROPERTY.

Bismarck, March 6.—About five this morning fire broke out in the Tribune building, owned by M. H. Jewell, and in a few minutes was beyond control of the fire department. The fire began near the center of the Tribune building, in the stock room. The forms for the morning issue of the paper were closed and the printers had most of them left the composing room, when the appearance of smoke alarmed those who were left. The smoke increased so rapidly and their place in the interior of the building was so dangerous that the men could not risk an attempt to save the forms or type. Nothing was saved. Next to the Tribune was the store of Jake Hanauer, which is a total loss, and next was the postoffice, the upper story of which the family of the postmaster, Colonel Lounsbury, was occupying. The family barely escaped with their night clothes. The attention of the postmaster being turned to the saving of the mail matter, in which he succeeded, with the exception of a few registered packages bound west. All records of the office were burned, however, and fixtures valued at \$5,000. Representative Johnson, of Brown county, and Councilman Gamble, of Yankton, who were rooming over Hanauer's store, barely escaped with their lives. Loss about 30,000; insured for about one half.
