Territory of Dakota, County of Griggs, ss.
To the Board of County Commissioners of said County:
The undersigned, freeholders residing within the immediate neighborhood of the route hereinafter mentioned and described for a public road, do hereby petition you to cause to be laid out and opened a public road of the width of sixty feet, as follows: Commencing at the Ottawa bridge road, about 100 rods west of s-e corner of sec. 25, town 148 range 59, thence east on the most eligible route to the side hill of the bluffs on the east side of the Sheyenne river, thence running south following as near as possible the side hills of the bluffs to the quarter post on north side of sec. 8, town 147, range 58, thence to follow the old road as near as possible in a southeasterly direction to the quarter post on the west side of section 24, town 147, range 58, thence east to the quarter post on the east side of said section 24.
