The celebrated French chemist, M. Louis Pasteur, claims to have discover; ed a complete antidote of hydrophobia. He says:

From to-day anybody bitten b" a mad dog has only to present himself at the

intensity by transmission to certain antransmission to certain other anima's. With the rabbit the virus increases: with the monkey it decreases. I took the virus from the brain of a dog that had died from hydrophobia. With this virus I inoculated a monkey. The money died.

With the virus weakened in intensity -taken from this monkey-I inoculated a second monkey. With the virus taken from the second monkey I inoculated a third menkey, and so on until I obtained a virus so weak as to be harmlated a rabbit, the virus being at once increased in intensity.
