The Wheat Crop.

The Commissioner of Agriculture, of Kentucky, is of the opinion that but 40 per cent of last year's wheat crop will be harvested, owing to frosts; the secretary of the board of agriculture, of Missouri, reports a probability of 50 per cent; Pennsylvania expects half a crop; the Michigan wheat is healthy, and a full yield is expected; Maryland will be short 25 per cent; California counts only on 10,000,000 bushels; Wisconsin calculates on 15,000,000 bushels, or 75 per cent of last year's yield; spring wheat in Iowa is very backward m Virginia but 3,000,000 bushels are counted upon, as against 7,000,000 in 1834the most unpromising outlook since 1836; Alabama wheat is hardly out of the ground, although it was approaching harvest this time last year; Georgia will be surprised if it gets 50 per cent of the crop of 1884; New York promises the usual amount; Indiana has never met such a discouraging outlook,-thousands of acres have been plowed up; Illinois is short in acreage 15 per cent, and the condition of the crop is discouraging; Kansas hopes for half a crop; the Nebraska crop is as yet a problem; Tennessee counts upon 45 per cent of a crop; Ohio will be satisfied with 22,000,-000 bushels, instead of 41,000,000; in Dakota the acreage is about 10 per cent less than in 1884, and our seeding having been done in good season, and rain having started the plant, it is to be hoped that a yield equal to that of last year will be had. A good price is assured, and the only danger that we can reasonably fear is a drouth latter in the
