A Horrible Tale.

At the inquest on the body of Lottie Cook Onofri at Philadelphia recently, the revolting story of her cruel death was told under oath. Her stepfather, the Italian, C. Achille Onofri, who is accused of killing her, was present as a prisoner and seemed to be overwhelmed by the predicament in which his brutal nature has brought him. The body of the child who was only 9 years old, was covered with cuts and bruises. The coroner's physicians testified that her veins were almost empty and that the child had literally been starved and beaten to death. On Monday it was shown that Onofri flogged little Lottie nearly all day, using a thick rope, a heavy strap and a shovel, the handle of the latter being broken on her head or body. Her stepfather also tied her hand and foot and compelled her to kneel down for hours. At night she crawled upstairs to bed and because she moaned and complained of her back Onofri beat her again with the shovel. It was shown that after lying quiet a while the dying child again began to moan, when her stepfather, in a great rage, fell upon her, smothered her head under a pillow and sat upon it. When released, the young victim, her little sister Mabel said, lay very quiet. Onofri struck her twice in the face with his fist, although she did not stir, and struck her again with the shovel. Then becoming alarmed at the increasing pallor of her little face, the stepfather sent for a doctor. When the physician arrived the child was in Onofri's arms, dead. The case was continued in order that the testimony of the other children may be taken.

With Uncovered Heads.

The most wonderful transformation scene I ever saw in the matter of hats was on Fleet street, London, after President Garfield's death. It became known that the queen had ordered the great bell of St. Paul's to be tolled, an honor never before accorded, except to the memory of an English sovereign. Fleet street and Ludgate hill was one mass of hats, tall, black, glistening hats. All traffic was suspended. The old phrase, "a sea of hats," was most apt to this scene and this was literally the Black sea. Probably no one in the thousands there had ever heard the mournful sound of that great bell. The immense crowd waited patiently for hours. Then came the first low, dull, sonorous stroke of the long silent bell. Instantly every hat was removed and the change from a sea of hats to a sea of heads was most magical. The English crowd stood, while that bell tolled, with uncovered heads, a token of respect for the uncrowned monarch who lay dead beyond the ocean.—Detroit Free Press.
