The door sprung back after he got in, and a shot was heard, and it was thought on the outside that he was hit. but as he landed on the floor, Col. Washington, who was the prisoner of the insurgents, cried out. "God bless you, Green, there's Brown." He was able to dodge the shot that was intended for him.
