What Archbishop Tache Says of Riel.

Archbishop Tache of Manitoba passed through St. Paul, en route from Winnipeg to Montreal. He spent the time of his stay as the guest of Bishop Ireland. Interviewed by a reporter Archbishop Tache said:

The telegraphic report from Winnipeg, stating that I left hurriedly for the East to interfere for Riel's life, is a bold and false statement. So far from leaving hurriedly, I should have been at Montreal three months ago to attend to my educational charges; but delayed my departure because of this trouble. Now that it has nearly subsided, I return to my work. I do not think any effort will be made in Riel's behalf, except to engage some counsel to defend him. His language in regard to the clergy since his arrest has considerably decreased the sympathy for him, and I think that whatever remains is now rather opposition to the government on the part of the Liberals than friendship or sympathy for Riel. Under any circumstances the feeling in his behalf will not be sufficient to cause any trouble. He will be tried, and if convicted, sentence passed upon him without any demonstration on the part of his friends. My connection with Riel has been greatly exaggerated and an extensive romance woven out of nothing. When I went to St. Boniface, in 1857, I found young Riel, young Schmidt and young Macdonald—three half-breed boys of thirteen—at school. I took an interest in them, as in all members of my flock, and as they were bright and intelligent, I secured them scholarships and gratuitous education in schools in Lower Canada. I saw very little of them, however. I was away a good many years, and Riel afterward vanished for years. So that really I saw but very little of him. After the rebellion of 1869, for which there was a good deal of justification, I naturally took an interest in seeing that the word of the government given to Riel—through me—was kept, and I labored to that end.

This time, however, matters were very different. The trouble was outside of my diocese, in that of Bishop Grandin. I know that there was a good deal of dissatisfaction among the half-breeds, both among the priests and laymen, of armed preparations. There was no armed preparation. I do not think the real cause of the outbreak is understood. Of course the half-breeds were indignant and dissatisfied that the government was so slow in settling the claims; but the true cause was that they felt that they were looked down upon and reviled and treated with contempt by the new settlers and by the officials and people generally. This rankled terribly; that instead of being respected as the original settlers, they should be looked down upon with scorn, and considered beneath every new-comer. This feeling grew, and at last they took up arms. They did not attack the posts, but the government would ever send an expedition against them—they merely expected to have to cope with the mounted police. There were only 200 half-breeds concerned in the revolt, and about 150 Indians at or near Batavia's. Of these, at least fifty were unarmed, and the others very poorly armed. There were a few rifles, but many of them were almost worthless. They hoped to defeat the police, and thus compel respect for their claims. I think Archbishop Grandin made a very good campaign, considering the country and the bad season of the year. No, my brother, has nothing to do with Riel. I must get priests to fill the places of the lazar and wounded, and I have other things to attend. I believe that Riel is completely insane at this time and not responsible for his actions. He will be accorded a fair trial by the authorities, and freed or punished, in accordance with the verdict.

Ex-Gov. Hale's Big Failure. Keene, N. H., dispatch: The liabilities of ex-Gov. Hale, who has just failed, may reach \$1,000,000. His house here and interest in the Keene City company were attached for over \$277,000 by Mr. Parks, ex-Gov. Hale's agent, and several of the national banks of Keene. It is not known to what extent the liabilities are secured. Several banks hold Mr. Hale's paper. It is reported that Senator Blair and Frank M. Jones, of New Hampshire are among the chief creditors of Hale's paper. It is stated of the late Mr. Hale's statement showed him with a net worth \$700,000, with liabilities of \$100,000. The assets in this city are very light. It is rumored that Mr. Hale's investments for two or three years past have been very unsuccessful, and that he has lost heavily in railroad enterprises.

Ex-Gov. Hale's failure has involved a large number of Boston people and banks. Henry Hale of New York, brother of the ex-governor, is said to be involved \$40,000, and John Hale, another brother, \$20,000.

One of his unsuccessful enterprises was the Lebanon woolen mill, in which he sunk over \$50,000. Another unfortunate scheme was the purchase of an island near San Francisco, with the idea of starting a mammoth sheep or cattle ranch. Gov. Hale was interested in mines in Idaho, and it is said numerous New Hampshire farmers invested and lost heavily. Another scheme was the purchase of the Hotel Avon, this city, which also proved disastrous.

Dakota Banking Association. A Dakota Bankers' association was formed at Aberdeen recently, delegates being present from all the principal banking institutions in Central and Southern Dakota. The call did not originally extend to Northern Dakota, but after the association was formed it was decided to make it general for all Dakota, and consequently several members of the various committees hail from the north.

The following permanent officers were chosen for the coming year: Mr. Dices of Millbank, president; Wade of Gary, vice president; Steere of Pierre, secretary and as members of the legislative committee, Anderson of St. Lawrence, chairman, Gannon of Ellendale, Judd of Canton, Sweet of Fargo, Fairchild of Bismarck, Hutton of Grand Forks, besides an executive committee of eight.

After deciding upon a schedule of charges for exchange, machine and sight drafts, collection of deeds, fire and hail insurance notes, etc., and failing to agree as to whether interest on time deposits should be allowed, the association adjourned to convene on Wednesday, June 16, at Huron. Over fifty delegates were in attendance.

Big Storm in Dakota. Pierre, Dak., Special:—This vicinity was visited Friday the 6th by the severest hail, rain and wind storm known for years. The stones were as large as hen's eggs and came down as if shot from a howitzer. Windows were broken by the hundreds, and it is feared great damage will result to crops. The rain deluged the city, filling cellars, and all houses are surrounded by one vast sheet of water. Horses, chickens and cows were drowned and out-houses sent floating down the streets. In Wells' addition many small houses were upset by the wind. Benjamin McCrossan, T. S. Narup, Rhukle, Hollister & Crossan, H. J. Siemus, Ed. Webster, lost heavily, their goods being damaged. When the storm was at its height a large waterspout tore down the middle of the river, but avoided the city. Col. Bullard, of the Chicago & Northwestern railroad, a recognized weather prophet of Dakota, says the storm has had no equal.

The first annual encampment of the Minnesota Division, Sons of Veterans, U. S. A., was held in Minneapolis recently. From the reports of the several officers, it was learned that there are 13 camps and 833 members in good standing in the state, a net gain of 9 camps and nearly 200 members during the year. The election of officers resulted as follows: Commander—E. M. Van Cleave, Minneapolis. Lieutenant Commander—F. H. Russell, Duluth. Vice Lieutenant Commander—J. O. Philpot, Owatonna. Chaplain—J. A. Canfield, Waseca. Division Council—E. A. Conover, Maple Plain; F. C. Chapman, St. Paul, and A. S. Morgan, Minneapolis. Delegates to the Third grand division, which meets in Springfield, Ill., in August: George W. Penniman and A. S. Morgan, Minneapolis; alternates, L. E. Hale of Minneapolis, and R. O. Philpot of Owatonna. Delegates to the commandery-in-chief, which meets in Detroit, Mich., in September: E. H. Milham of St. Paul, and W. A. Mitchell of Minneapolis; alternates, George W. Knowlton of Minneapolis, and F. H. Russell of Duluth.
