A few Sundays ago Henry Ward Beecher made the following statements as to his faith. I am in hearty accord with revivals and revival preaching, with the educating forces of the church, and in sympathy with all ministers who, in their several ways, seek to build up men into the immage of Jesus Christ, by whose faithfulness, generosity and love I hope to be saved and brought home to heaven."

Oliver Dalrymple, in a note to a Fargo paper, says: "Please state, as I fear all Dakota farmers are not yet informed. that the Minnesota railroad and warehouse commissioners have abolished dockage on account of dirt in the elevators at Duluth and Minneapolis. I call attention to the above that the required cleaning mills and machinery may be provided throughout the territory in time for this great change in the handling of wheat."
