The Concert.

The concert Tuesday evening, under the auspices of the Ladies Aid society of the Congregational church, was a great success. The stage, by the ingenuity and labor of Messrs. Bryant and Stork, was quite metropolitan, with flies, drop curtain, etc., fitted without the driving of a nail or the breaking of plaster. The receipts of the evening were \$100.
