On motion ordered that all unpaid taxes, both real and personal, which were assessed and levied by Griggs county upon property within ranges 56 and 57, in towns 144 to 148 inclusive, which formerly belonged to Griggs county, and now forms a part of Steele county, be abated for the years 1883 and 1884 and that the county clerk and treasurer of Griggs county be and hereby are ordered to cancel off record all and every tax appearing due and unpaid upon the records in said clerk's and treasurer's offices for the said years against said property, assessed and levied as aforesaid.

Commissioner Rukke asked permission to withdraw from the meeting, which request was granted.

On motion ordered that an abatement of \$2.50 for road and school poll taxes for 1884, against Nathan Sifton, be made having been assessed twice.

On motion ordered that the road poll tax; \$1.50, against E. J. Western, be abated, being over age.

On motion ordered that the county surveyor be instructed to make a survey of the road across the southwest corner of section 32, tp 146, r 58.

On motion ordered that road district No. 11 be divided and numbered as follows, viz: Sections 19, 20, 21, 22, 27, 28, 29, 30, 31, 32, 33, and 34, tp. 145, range 59, to be and remain as road district No. 11, secs. 13, 24, 25, 26, 35, and 36, tp. 145, range 59, and sections 19, 20, 29, 30, 31, and 32, tp 145, range 58, to form road district No. 15. Secs. 5, 6, 7, 8, 17, 18, 19, 50, 29, 30, 31 and 32, tp 144, range 58, and secs. 1, 2, 11, 12, 13, 14, 23, 21, 25, 26, 35, and 36, tp 144, range 59, to form road district No. 16, and the four westerly tiers of sections in tp 144, range 59, to form road district No. 17.

On motion ordered that the following road supervisors be appointed, viz:

On motion ordered that the proposed road, commencing at the n-e corner sec. 1-146-58, and terminating at the quarter stake on south side sec. 1-146-59, be ordered opened in accordance with the report of the viewers.

On motion ordered that the proposed road, commencing at a point 23 89-100 chains eastward from quarter stake on south side sec. 22-146-58, and terminating at the southeast corner sec. 35-146-58, be ordered opened in accordance with the report of the reviewers of same and ordered that an order be drawn in favor of A. A. Fluto for \$106 67 in payment of damages to n-w4 sec. 26 146-58 awarded by said reviewers.

On motion ordered that the proposed road, commencing at a point in road about 20 chains southeast of bridge on 26-146-58, and terminating at a point in section line on east side sec. 6-146-58, be ordered opened in accordance with the report of the reviewers of same, and also ordered that a county order be drawn in favor of Andrew Carlson for \$38.33 in payment of damages to s-e 4 1-146-58, awarded by said reviewers.

On motion ordered that the proposed road, commencing at the Ottawa 146-58 road, about 100 rods west of southeast corner sec. 25-148-59, and terminating at the quarter stake on east side sec. 24-147-58, be ordered opened in accordance with the report of the viewers of the same.

Sutherland be appointed reviewers of that portion of a proposed road, commencing at quarter post on west side sec. 19-148-59, and terminating at the quarter post on south side sec. 29-148-59, and they are hereby requested to qualify, make said review, and report to this board as soon as possible.

Sirs:—We the undersigned, residents of the townships of Pleasant and Waziya hereby petition you honorable body to change the boundaries of said townships by transferring from Pleasant to Waziya sections 2 and 3 of town 146 n, range 58 w, the south half of sections 21, 22 and 23, and all of sections 26, 27, 28, 33 34 and 35 of town 147 n, range 58 w, and transferring from Waziya to Pleasant the north half of section 24 of town 147, r 58. Signed by Syver Sverson, Ole P. Overley, John M. Dahl and others.

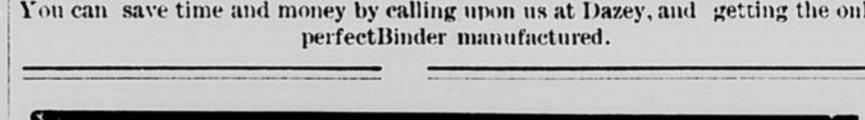
