#### A Vigorous Young Century Plant. Sacramento Union.

At the residence of J. P. Odbert, near the Sacramento County Hospital, is a century plant-not one hundred years old, but twenty-five years-which has recently sent up its stem for blossom, and marking the early termina-tion of the plant's life. The stem is forty-four feet in height and a foot in diameter at the base. This is said to be probably the largest and tallest stem that has ever been seen in this vicinity, sent up by one of these peculiar plants. It has been but a short time since the preparation for blossom first appeared, and a growth in twenty-one days of nine feet nine inches was observed by actual measurement.

from its formerly being supposed to live one hundred years before blossoming; that it then died, and remained in dormant germ another hundred years, and then grew again. In the tropics it will often blossom and die in ten or eleven years. The height given by botanists to which these stems grow is forty feet, but the one at Mr. Odbert's has reached four feet higher.



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
