"Replying to your inquiry relative to your pension claim certificate No. 297,520, it is proper to state that so much therein as is based on rheuma tism, piles and sore eyes was rejected on May 23, 1885, on the ground that there has been no pensionable disability therefrom since June 20, 1884, the date the claim therefor was filed."

Clements' claim was being looked after by Senator Hawley, and Mrs Hawley attends to all her husband's

I am informed that your pension is allowed, and I congratulate you Very truly, Joseph R. Hawley. "Per H. W. Hawley."

of Elma, N. Y., it went to Samuel Clemens, Elmira, N. Y. ("Mark Twain"), and that gentleman replied as follows: ELMIRA, N. Y., July 8, 1885.—John C. Black, Esq., Commissioner: Dear Sir-I have not applied for a pension. I have often wanted a pension-often, ever so often, I may say; but inasmach as the only military service I performed during the war was in the Confederate army, I have always felt a deli-cacy about asking for it. However, since you have suggested the thing yourself, I feel strengthened. I haven't any very pensionable disease myself, but I can furnish a substitute—a man who is just simply a chaos—a museum of all the different kinds of aches and pains, fractures, dislocations and malformations there are, a man who would regard "rheumatism, piles and sore eyes" as mere recreation and refreshment after the serious occupations of his day. If you grant me the pension, dear sir, please hand it to General Hawley, United States senaator-I mean, hand him the certificate to me. You will observe by his post-al-card, which I inclose, that he takes friendly interest in the matter. He thinks I've already got the pension, whereas I've only got the rheumatism; but I don't want that; I had that before. I wishit were catching: I know a man that I would load up with it pretty early. Lord! but we all feel that way sometimes. I've seen the day when-but never mind that-you may be busy. Just hand it to Hawley—the certificate, you understand, if not transferable.

Current Notes.

The head of the Roman Catholic missions in China reports that 10,000 native converts have been massacred within ten years. Five white missionaries have been lost.

The old Parliaments of both France and England have finally adjourned, and will be replaced by freshly chosen Parliaments this autumn. The general elections for a new Chamber of Deputies in France will take place in October; and those for a new House of Commons in Great Britain and Ireland will occur in November.

The authorities of the Congo Free State have forbidden the importation into that country of percussion guns and breech loaders, and announce that they will fine any trader 25,000 france who violates this regulation.
Among the largest articles of import are flint locks and very poor shot-guns made for the African trade. Traders are still permitted to sell the Instead of going to Samuel Clements, natives as many of these arms as they will buy, but in the interest of the public security it has been deemed best to prohibit the sale of improved weapons.
