It seems to be the first time in the history of those regions that the people have had anything to say about anything.

United States Envoy to Mexico.
The international complications which are liable to grow out of the arrest and imprisonment of Editor Cutting in Mexico for a libel on a Mexican published in the United States and circulated in Mexico have ended through the release of Cutting. To avoid further difficulties between the sister republics Mr. Arthur G. Sedgwick, of New York, has been chosen a special envoy from the United States to Mexico to examine the laws of the latter country for the purpose of bringing about a method of extraditing and punishing offenders on both sides of the Rio Grande. Mr. Sedgwick is both a journalist and lawyer. As attorney and counsel for the International Copyright League he has made himself familiar with many of the intricate points of international law.

One reporter says that he got \$3,000 for the exploit, another that he got nothing at all, but was merely trying to throw his life away, because he was unhappy and desperate.
