October 28th. after midnight the westbound limited was ditched at East Rio siding, a small station about thirteen miles east of Portage, on the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul road.

The accident was caused by an open containing the name of Lander for reg- about fifty miles an hour. The siding is in a cut where the road curves, so that the switch light cannot be seen from the so the engineer of the limited could not see the switch light turned wrong, until too late to stop. The engine left the track and ran a short distance, and brought up against the side of the cut. toppled over the baggage car, and two regular coaches, while four sleepers kept the track. The engine and cars that went off were badly smashed, and soon took fire from the stoves.




