

How Mules Saved an Army.

Prior to the battle of Nashville, Maj. Gen. James L. Donaldson (who won honors in the Mexican war, and who died in the spring of 1886) was Quartermaster under Gen. Thomas, Having occasion to purchase mules for the army, he ordered a person in whom he had confidence to visit the contiguous Northern States, inadvertently saying to him, "Buy as many as you can"—not supposing he would be able to secure more than a few thousand at the most. Some weeks afterward, just before the attack upon Hood's army, Gen. Donaldson, on meeting his agent, inquired how many he had been able to secure. To the amazement of the General he was informed that 25,000 or more had been obtained. Upon which the astonished General exclaimed: "I am a ruined man! I shall be court-martialed and be driven from the army for not limiting you in the purchase. You have procured many times more than I had any idea or intention of purchasing; but the fault is mine, not yours. I ought to have been particular in my orders."

In an extremely disheartened state he went to his home, believing that such a thoughtless act on his part could not be overlooked by the commanding General. He had scarcely reached his house before a messenger came from Gen. Thomas with an order for Gen. Donaldson to come immediately to headquarters. This seemed to be the sealing of his fate, and in a state of trepidation bordering on frenzy he appeared before Gen. Thomas, whom he found in a mood apparently of great depression. Soon after Donaldson had entered his presence Gen. Thomas said: "Donaldson, how many mules have you?" With some perturbation he replied: "Upward of 25,000." "Twenty-five thousand did you say?" repeated the General: "Is it possible that you have this number?" Donaldson, accept my most heartfelt thanks; you have saved this army! I can now have transportation and can fight Hood, and will do so at once."—The Century.

Perhaps no man in public life in the United States ever had so strong a personal following as Henry Clay. His friends were everywhere, and they were so numerous that he himself never knew them half by name. When the "Mill Boy of the Slashes" was the candidate of the Whig for the Presidency, it became known that he had overdrawn his bank account at the Maysville Bank for a considerable sum. One day three gentlemen, strangers to President Scott of that institution, called at the bank and asked Mr. Scott how much Clay had overdrawn. He replied tersely that that was none of their business, and that his bank was not in the habit of telling strangers the private affairs of its customers. The visitors said they had come to make the account good, and that they had asked the question that they might know how much would be required of them. That placed a different phase on the situation, and Mr. Scott told them that Mr. Clay's account was overdrawn to an amount approximating \$30,000. The visitors opened their saddle-bags and immediately paid over the amount. Mr. Scott tried to find out who they were, but was unsuccessful, and up to the day of his death he never knew who were the benefactors of his customer. Mr. Scott's son, now a resident of Bloomington, Ill., would be interested to know who were the riders who carried \$30,000 in their saddlebags to save the name of Henry Clay, but no one has yet been able to enlighten him.—Baltimore American.

A Sepoy Soldier Runs Amuck.

A shocking tragedy occurred at Kurrahee on the 25th of last month. A Sepoy of the Twenty-sixth Native Infantry having got possession of forty rounds of ammunition, ran amuck through the lines at 1 o'clock in the morning. He first shot two Sepoys who were asleep in the barrack veranda. The alarm was immediately sound-

ed and the regiment turned out, but nothing could be done till daylight, when detachments were sent in various directions to search for him. Meanwhile the murderer had proceeded to the soldiers' bazaar and had shot four shopkeepers who were sleeping outside their houses. He then went to the plain behind the infantry lines and shot five cartmen. When he found that the regiment had turned out, he took refuge in a stone inclosure, whence he fired many rounds. The Colonel called for volunteers to rush in upon him, and two Sepoys responded. When they got within six yards of him he shot himself through the heart. The eleven men whom he had shot were killed on the spot or died in a few hours.

Saved By a Dog.

Last Monday Mrs. Ira Richmond of Golden, Mich., was driving the reaper across the field when the tongue broke. The horses started on and Mrs. Richmond was thrown into the machinery near the large wheel, and a deep gash was cut in her left leg at the knee. The farm dog, as is his habit sometimes, went to the head of the team and stopped it, or the wound would have been more serious and the result probably fatal.—Detroit Free Press.
