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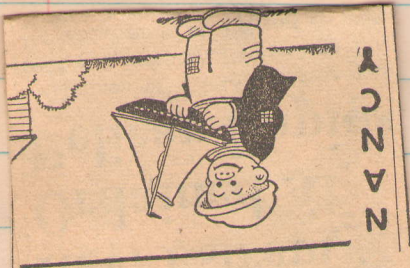

CARL ELSAAS IS KILLED BY KICK OF HORSE IN HEAD

Passed Away Early Sunday
Morning Following the
Injury.

FUNERAL HELD TUESDAY

Was Very Highly Respected
by All Who Knew
Him.

Though four days have since his passing, this community has not yet been able to fully realize that Carl Elsaas, farmer residing north and east of Cooperstown, is no longer of this world. His end was brought about so suddenly and so unexpectedly that his many friends will long experience difficulty in realizing that he is gone.

Saturday evening at about 8:30 o'clock Mr. Elsaas was in the barn on his farm caring for the horses. One of his boys was just outside the barn, and it was this boy, and he alone, who witnessed the injury inflicted upon his father through the kick of one of the horses. The hoof of the horse struck Mr. Elsaas squarely upon his right temple. The blow caused such injury that the man never regained consciousness passing away at seven o'clock the next morning.

Funeral services were held at the Ringsaker church Tuesday afternoon Rev. Estrem officiating, and the throng in attendance at the funeral strongly showed the high esteem in which Carl Elsaas was held by the many people who knew him.

Carl Otto Elsaas was born in Ottertail county, Minnesota, July 18, 1881. In 1889 he moved with his parents to Griggs county, where he has since made his home.

In 1900 he bought the farm where he lived until time of his death on October 1st. In 1905 he married Miss Amanda Johnson. Erick Erickson, Griggs Pioneer, Dies On Sunday

Aged Settler Passes Away At Long Beach Home Suddenly 2-36

Erick Erickson, 81, pioneer in Griggs and for over 40 years active in a number of enterprises throughout the county, died suddenly in his home at Long Beach, Cal., Sunday evening. Funeral services were conducted Tuesday. No particulars are available as to the cause of his death but it is attributed to heart failure as several of his friends in Cooperstown had received cards from him mailed Christmas Day and which bore no references to an illness of any sort. He moved from Cooperstown about 1920.

His activities here included the operation of an implement and machinery business and store in association with Albert Larson, Lewis and Andrew Berg, an implement business in partnership with T. G. Thompson and Oliver Huff, and the ownership of an elevator in Cooperstown. He was vice-president of the old State bank in Cooperstown and had extensive land holdings in Griggs, listing over 2,500 acres at one time.

Born In Norway

Erick Erickson was born in Bergen, Norway, June 20, 1855, and was the youngest of a family of three sons and two daughters. In 1856 he moved with his stepfather, Jacob Wallen, to the United States, settling in Dane county, Wis., where he remained for two years before moving to Jackson county. Absalom, the eldest brother of Mr. Erickson, and several cousins enlisted in the services of the Union army during the Civil War.

In 1882 Mr. Erickson moved from Wisconsin and homesteaded on a farm in Nelson county, North Dakota. He lived on this farm for seven years. He then sold his homestead and moved to Cooperstown and opened an implement business. Two years later he added a stock of merchandise.

In 1895 he went into partnership with Albert Larson and Lewis and Andrew Berg. They operated a store and machinery and implement business in a frame building on the present site of the Cooperstown Hardware store. This partnership was dissolved in 1905 but he still continued to run the implement business, Albert Larson having taken over the store.

He purchased an implement business in Jessie in 1906. This place was conducted by his son, Edwin. In 1908 he traded this store for farm land and entered in a partnership with T. G. Thompson and Oliver Huff to establish a general store in the rising town of Sutton. He purchased a large amount of stock in the State bank of Sutton, the State bank of Jessie and the State bank of Cooperstown.

Runs Elevator

In 1912 he purchased an elevator in Cooperstown, and continued buying grain under the name of the Erickson company. He was also a stockholder in several farmers' elevators and was prominently connected with the grain trade.

Erick Erickson was married to Miss Isabella Tvetaken in 1884. Two children were born, Edwin O., Tacoma, Wash., and Myrtle S., (Mrs. Vedler) Long Beach, Calif.

Mr. Erickson was identified with the Sons of Norway lodge and with the Masonic order, being active in the latter organization when it was building the new \$35,000 building in Cooperstown.

Heart failure was again the cause of sudden death in the case of Mrs. Edland at her home in Cooperstown on Friday, funeral services for whom were held at the Westley church south of Cooperstown on Sunday afternoon. Burial was made in the Westley church cemetery, beside her husband who died several years ago.

Martha Lee, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Carl J. Lee, was born at Kongsberg, Norway, March 12, 1867. She came to this country with her parents when she was six years old, and settled near Audubon, Minn. She was married to Swen Edland in 1886 and they moved to North Dakota in 1898, making her home in this vicinity since that time. Preceding her in death are her husband and five children. Surviving are one daughter and three sons: Norman, Arthur and Clarence, all of Cooperstown, besides sixteen grandchildren. One sister, Mrs. Hans Houkom of Kyle, Sask., and two brothers, John Lee of Silverton, Ore., and Fredrick Lee of Audubon, Minn., also survive.

Erven Erickson Is Dead At Age 69

Well Known Griggs County Man Passes at Home Sat- urday Evening 1930

Daniel Erickson, one of the best known old settlers in this part of the county, passed away at his home southeast of Cooperstown on Saturday evening, May 24, following an illness of several weeks, from which it was known he could not recover. Mr. Erickson died from complications resulting from a cold which he contracted several weeks ago. Funeral services were held on Wednesday of this week from the home at 1 o'clock in the afternoon and from the Zion church at 2 o'clock. Rev. Sydness of Blabon conducted the services and the remains were laid to rest in the church cemetery, beside that of his wife who died on March 15th.

Obituary

Daniel Erickson was born in Enefors, Hjemtland, Sweden, on September 14, 1850. He came to America in the spring of 1880, and went to Osakis, Minn., where he worked and farmed for about a year. In the fall of 1881 he came to this county to look over the prospects in this section for making a future home, following which he returned to Osakis. In March of 1883, however, he returned to this section and built the home in which the family lived, on the land belonging to him at the time of his death. The house which he constructed at that time is still standing on its original foundation. He and the family made the trip from Minnesota in the usual mode of travel those days—the covered wagon.

He was united in marriage to Edrika Johnson on April 26, 1882. Six children were born to this union, three sons: Emanuel, John D., and Oscar A., all of this community; and three daughters: Mrs. Christina Nelson of Atwater, Minn., Mrs. Emma Erickson and Mrs. Hilma Olgaard of Cooperstown. One brother and sister still live in Sweden.

Death came from an illness which started soon after his wife's death on March 15, of this year. With his wife's passing Mr. Erickson's inter-

est in life ceased and he never recovered from the shock caused by the separation from his life's companion. A cold contracted shortly after his wife's death resulted in complications which brought his death on Saturday evening.

Edrika Johnson was born in Trondhjem, Norway, on May 8, 1851. In the spring of 1879 she came to the United States, going directly to Zumbrota, Minn., where she worked three years. On April 26, 1882, she was united in marriage to Daniel Erickson, and they engaged in farming in that community until the spring of 1883 when Mr. Erickson left to locate a home in Dakota Territory. He filed on the present homestead in March and occupied a few weeks in building a log cabin and otherwise making the claim habitable, returning then to Zumbrota. In June of the same year, the young couple made the journey to their new home, their belongings consisting of a team of horses, a "prairie schooner," a cow, a pig, a few household goods and other belongings. Mr. and Mrs. Erickson have made their original claim their home ever since.

The funeral yesterday was largely attended, friends from all over the county coming to pay their last respects to a splendid Christian character. Ever since the establishment of the Ness church she had been an active member and a worker in the Ladies' Aid society. Surviving besides her husband, are three sons: Emanuel, John D., and Oscar A., all residents of the community; and three daughters: Mrs. Christina Nelson of Atwater, Minn., Mrs. Emma Erickson and Mrs. Hilma Olgaard of this community; thirty-two grand children, two brothers and two sisters, living in Norway, and another sister living in Sanders, Mont. 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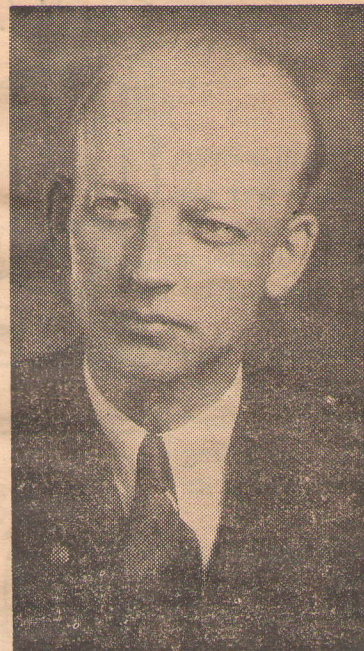


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Hunter Couple's Descendants Hold Reunion In Cooperstown

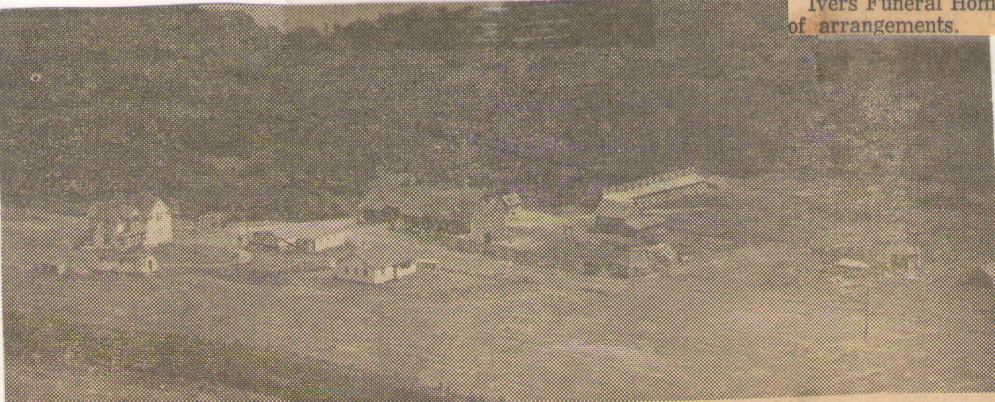
