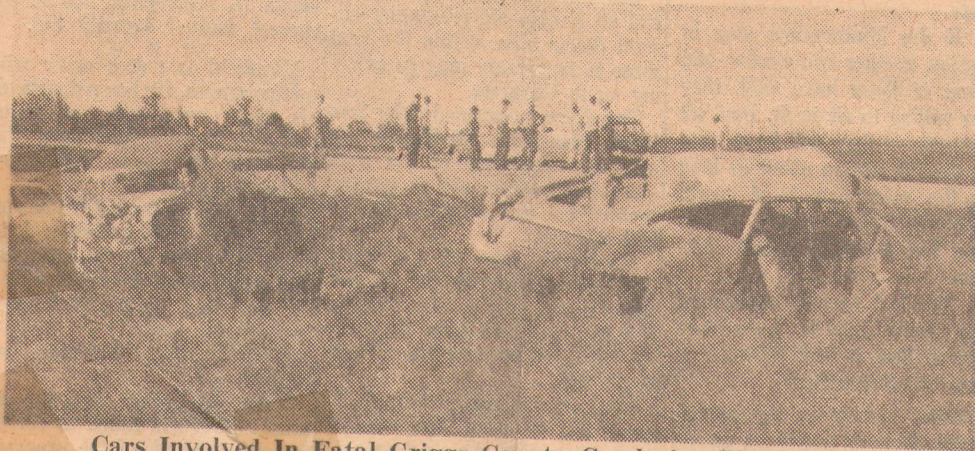

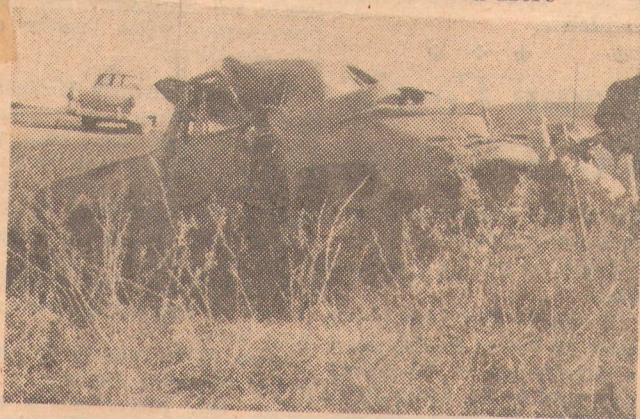

FINLEY, N. D. (P)—L. A. Sayer, Cooperstown businessman, is the Republican Organizing Committee choice for state senator from Griggs-Steele counties in a special election Nov. 4.

Ira Schannach Of Lake Park Dies At 96

Ira Schannach, 96, oldest resident of Lake Park, Minn., died Sunday at his home. He had operated a harness shop in Lake Park since 1879 and was still active in the business at the time of his death.

He was the father of the late Joseph W. Schannach, widely known sportsman and writer and former compositor of The Fargo Forum, who died in November, 1950.

Mr. Ira Schannach was born Jan. 1, 1856, in Tyrol, Austria. While an infant, he came with his parents to Frontenac, Minn. When he was 18, he went to Lake City, Minn., where he began 4½ years apprenticeship in the harness making trade.

He worked at his trade in Red Wing, Willmar, Benson, Morris, Hutchinson, St. Peter, Windom and Detroit Lakes, Minn., and Sioux City, Ia. On March 21, 1879, he married Elizabeth Merklely at Lake City. She died in March, 1947.

The Schannachs came to Lake Park in 1879 where he rented a building and opened his harness shop. In 1881, he erected a combined store and home, the first building on what is now Lake Park's main street.

He played cornet in the village band 50 years and served 26 years on the Board of Education, 16 as president. He was also village recorder 24 years.

Survivors are a daughter, Mrs. Edward Peck of Pelican Rapids, Minn.; a son, William of Leavenworth, Wash.; nine grandchildren and six great-grandchildren.

Mrs. Sjkovist, who suffered bruises and cuts, crawled from the car and got a jack from the wreckage. She was the only adult in the two cars who was not fatally injured.

Mrs. Sjkovist jacked up the car and pulled her child free. Berry suffered a broken arm. Also in the car were the 10-year-old Sjkovist twins, Ingmar Jr. and Inga.

The coroner said Friday that the investigation is continuing and no decision has been made on whether an inquest will be held.

He said Mr. Haaland and Mr. Sjkovist were drivers of the cars. * * *

Addition To Be Ready Soon

Cooperstown School Adds Classrooms, Other Space

COOPERSTOWN, N. D.—Cooperstown grade school children will be moving into a new addition to the present building in a few weeks, which will relieve an overcrowded situation in the elementary school.

The \$111,000 addition houses four classrooms, an office and a boiler room for new equipment for the entire elementary school. The old boiler room will be converted into a music room, said Supt. Henry G. Bryant.

Bryant said there are 272 pupils in the first six grades, up 76 from last year.

The increase is partly needed, he said, because children from

two additional townships are attending the Cooperstown elementary school on a tuition basis. Four townships and part of a fifth now send children into Cooperstown.

Bryant said that last year two buses carried the children. There are five buses this year.

With the addition to the grade school nearing completion, Cooperstown school officials are planning ahead for a possible election next year on reorganization.

One such reorganization, which would bring about eight townships into the Cooperstown district, was defeated.

However, Bryant said since the children from outside of Cooperstown city limits have been attending school in town, the attitudes of many who opposed reorganization have changed.

The Cooperstown High School already is furnishing high school training to pupils residing within a radius of 10 to 12 miles from the city.

There are 240 pupils in junior and senior high school, up 20 from a year ago. The increase is taxing the capacity of the high school facilities, Bryant said.

But before a new school or an addition to the high school building can be built, the district's tax

base will have to be broadened, Bryant added.

The present district limits coincide with the Cooperstown city limits, within which the taxable valuation is about \$650,000.

Should the district be reorganized on the basis as proposed, the taxable valuation would be increased to more than three million dollars, Bryant said.
